- 1 The end of the American Civil War meant the end of Slavery. In 1870, all the eligible Male citizens
- 2 were able to Vote. However, blacks were discouraged by Violence. In 1896: The Supreme Court
- 3 ruled to maintain racial Segregation in private businesses. Thanks to a case called Plessy V. Ferguson
- 4 many southern states applied this separate but equal mentality. This led to the application of Jim
- 5 Crow Laws which resulted in blacks being treated as second class Citizens. There were Segregated
- 6 schools, buses, restrooms and fountains. It continued well until the 1900s. In 1909, a group of
- 7 prominent black and white campaigners created the National association for the Advancement of
- 8 coloured people. (NAACP) Their goal was to increase racial equality and challenge issues like the
- 9 Jim Crow Laws. Between 1910 and 1930 the white supremacist group, the Ku Klux Klan saw it
- 10 biggest expansion. In Brown V Board of Education of Topeka (1954) the Supreme Court declared
- 11 state laws establishing separate public schools for black and white students to be unconstitutional.
